To revaid just a little by perhaps we should first discuss paper more in depth. 'Normal paper, such as newspaper or notebook paper, is made out of cellulate.' For this, trees are chemically broken down into wood fibers.' Then, the cellulose fibers are selected to form very thin sheets of paper.

The process to create paper money is quite different. For the production of money, cotton and linen fabric are beaten into fibers.' This is then used to produce the money we handle.' There is 25% linen and 75% paper in the money we handle.' Interestingly, before World War I silk was the chosen fiber used in place of linen.

The fibers that bond together money are much stronger than the eres beliging together regular paper.' The fibers used in money are basically unaffected by water, whereas cellulose fibers absorb water and then fall apart when wet.'
